Our excellent ratings in the highly prestigious International Student Barometer (ISB), where we scored 98% for satisfaction and placed in the top 5 in the UK are further evidence of the high standards deliver for international students. This is alongside ongoing efforts to represent people from all backgrounds.

There have been many highlights again this year. However, we feel we must single out another memorable set of Student Officer and National Union of Students (NUS) National Conference Rep Elections, TUSU is led bu students for students, so it is vital that they participate in the democratic process to choose the people who lead it and represent them. We had over 30 candidates from various parts of the world and secured another record turnout. Over 4,300 students had their say, casting over 15,000 votes across four highlu competitive elections.

For two of us (Eby and Nigil), our journey as Student Officers ends this summer; we thank everuone who originally elected us, along with the talented and experienced people who have supported us. We are all confident that TUSU will go from strength to strength in 2023/24 as we collectively build on all that has been achieved. STRIVING TO SERVE STUDENTS

In a year where the University returned to full operation and we saw another significant growth in the number of international students we welcomed, TUSU has been at the very heart of student life, providing essential spaces, support, activities, and events.

The SU Student Support (SUSS) team helped thousands of students with academic and accommodation issues. Meanwhile, their work accrediting local landlords and letting agents successfully continued. Staff once again helped to ensure safer, better-quality housing and fair student tenancy agreements.



They also provided vital support to those still seeking the right place to live and needing short-term accommodation. Their retention, for a seventh time, of the prestigious Advice Quality Standard (AQS) is testament to the quality of the support provided.

Meanwhile the School and Course Reps that the SUSS team train and manage provided an important grassroots link between students and senior management in each school. Their feedback also helped to make our Student Officers aware of ongoing issues and identify possible solutions.

The TUSU Activities service has supported a record number of societies and society members in 2022/23, helping groups to run smoothly and develop the experience they provide to members. In the first-ever year of entirely free membership of societies, the team worked closely with a wide range of individuals, including many from an international background, to deliver distinctive events celebrating various cultures and faiths.

DEMOCRACY IN ACTION

Records were again broken in this year's Student Officer and National Union of Students (NUS) National Conference Rep Elections as over 30 candidates from a wide range of backgrounds and, in many cases, originally from outside of the UK competed for the coveted positions. They were looking to secure the roles of President Education, President Wellbeing or President International. Other students wanted to represent Teesside University at the biggest single annual gathering of students' unions. A place where they would be able to participate in the national decision-making about student issues.

A new record of 4,308 eligible students had their say casting 15,446 votes across the four hotly contested ballots after a busy week of campaigning. We are delighted to say we have seen our second ever all international Student Officer team elected (see Page 8) and they will officially take office or resume their role from the start of July.



MEET THE NEW GUYS!

After voting in the TUSU Elections 2023, which concluded at the start of March, we saw only our second-ever all international Student Officer team elected. Femi Abolade (President Wellbeing from July 2023) secured a second term and will be joined by Nevin Edwin, who takes over the role of President Education and Michael Adewunmi, who will take up the new role of President International. Femi and Michael are both from Nigeria, while Nevin is from India. They will officially take office from the start of July this year.



Femi: "I was delighted to be entrusted by students with the responsibility of being a Trustee of their Students' Union and one of their elected officers for a second year, it is a truly wonderful thing to be the voice of students, and it also continues to help me develop my skills and experience. I want, working with my colleagues, to continue and build on the important work being done this year and do more on issues such as childcare and the level of support that students living with disabilities receive."



Nevin: "Having studied and lived here for three years now, I have developed a strong understanding of the challenges faced by those who have relocated to Teesside from outside of the UK. I recognised this new Student Officer role as an excellent opportunity to apply my knowledge and make a real difference while developing as a person. It's a huge honour to be the first holder of the role, and it presents a unique opportunity for me, working with others, to make life even better for international students, both on and off campus."



Michael: "I have three goals above anything else. I am keen to see more peer-to-peer mentoring between students with those who are doing particularly well on their course or have already completed some studies sharing their knowledge and experience with others. I also want to continue the good work that has been done this year on academic misconduct to further improve awareness of this important matter. Finally, I want to try and widen the academic opportunities available to students, including scholarships and placements."
